9. Background: The Gasparilla Island Solid Waste Disposal MSTU was originally established by Ordinance 81-63 which was adopted by the Board of County Commissioners on December 23, 1981. This ordinance was then amended by the Board on April 15, 1992 to include the maintenance of a streetlighting system.

In September, 2005, the Lee County Animal Services entered into a service provider agreement with Florida Gulf Coast University to conduct a study of the iguana population on Gasparilla Island. The study revealed that at least 10,000 iguanas now inhabit the island, significantly impacting homeowners as well as the environment. The Gasparilla Island property owners, through the Gasparilla Island Community Involvement Association (GICIA), and the Boca Grande Isles Property Owners Association have requested that the Board amend the ordinance scope of services to include invasive exotic animal species control.

LEE COUNTY ORDINANCE NO.

AN ORDINANCE CREATING THE GASPARILLA ISLAND MUNICIPAL SERVICE TAXING UNIT; REPEALING LEE COUNTY ORDINANCE NOS. 81-63 AND 92-28; PROVIDING FOR CREATION OF THE UNIT, PURPOSE AND BOUNDARIES; ESTABLISHING THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS AS THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE UNIT; PROVIDING FOR THE GENERAL POWERS OF THE GOVERNING BODY AND LEVYING OF AD VALOREM TAXES; PROVIDING FOR A FUND, SEVERABILITY AND EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County, Florida, is the governing body in and for Lee County, Florida; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County, Florida, is authorized pursuant to Chapter 125, Florida Statutes, to enact Ordinances necessary in the exercise of its powers; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County, Florida, had previously adopted Ordinance No. 81-63 relating to the creation of the Gasparilla Island Solid Waste Municipal Service Taxing Unit; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County, Florida, amended Ordinance No. 81-63 by adopting Ordinance No. 92-28 providing for the inclusion of the maintenance of a street lighting system; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County, Florida, desires to expand the scope of services for the municipal service taxing unit to provide for invasive exotic animal species control; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County, Florida, further desires to consolidate and update the scope of services provided by the municipal service

taxing unit and establish one Ordinance addressing the current municipal services provided to Gasparilla Island.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF LEE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:

SECTION ONE: REPEALER, CREATION OF THE M.S.T.U., PURPOSE AND BOUNDARIES

Lee County Ordinances 81-63 and 92-28 are hereby repealed and replaced with the provisions of this Ordinance. The purpose of repealing these Ordinances is to update the scope of services provided by the Municipal Service Taxing Unit and establish one ordinance addressing the current municipal services provided to Gasparilla Island.

Pursuant to the powers granted to the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County, Florida, hereinafter referred to as the "Board," by the Constitution of the State of Florida and the Florida Statutes, in particular, Section 125.01, Florida Statutes, the Board hereby creates a municipal service taxing or benefit unit to be known as the "Gasparilla Island M.S.T.U." Unless expressly mandated by state statute, any and all procedures, administrative or otherwise, which were required to be followed prior to the enactment of this ordinance shall be waived or considered directory in nature and noncompliance with the procedure shall have no effect upon the validity of this ordinance, constitutional or otherwise.

The purpose of the Gasparilla Island M.S.T.U. is to provide the following municipal services within the boundaries of the M.S.T.U.:

 Maintenance of a street lighting system within the boundaries of the M.S.T.U.; and (2) Invasive exotic animal species control within the boundaries of the M.S.T.U.

The boundaries of the M.S.T.U. shall be as follows:

SEE LEGAL DESCRIPTION ATTACHED HERETO AND MADE A PART HEREOF. (EXHIBIT A)

SECTION TWO: GOVERNING BODY

The Board shall be the governing body of the Gasparilla Island M.S.T.U.

SECTION THREE: GENERAL POWERS

The governing body shall have all the powers necessary or convenient to carry out the purpose of this Ordinance and such additional rights and powers as are provided by the Constitution of the State of Florida and the laws of the State of Florida as granted to counties. The governing body shall also have all the powers not otherwise prohibited by law and these powers shall include, but are not limited to, the power to:

- Sue or be sued, complain or defend in the name of the County, in any and all courts or administrative agencies;
- Acquire by grant, purchase, gift, devise, exchange or in any other lawful manner, any property, real or personal, or any estate or interest therein upon such terms and conditions as the governing body shall determine;
- Enter into contracts with any public, private or municipal firm, person or corporation for the furnishing of the improvements within the boundaries of the M.S.T.U.;
- Levy and collect special charges, special assessments, or taxes within the
 Unit;

- Borrow and expend money and issue bond, revenue certificates and other obligations of indebtedness in such manner and subject to such limitations as may be provided by law;
- Levy and collect without referendum ad valorem taxes for the providing of municipal services within the M.S.T.U.; and
- 7. Adopt rules and regulations governing the M.S.T.U.

SECTION FOUR: LEVYING AD VALOREM TAXES

Ad valorem taxes levied pursuant to this Ordinance shall be levied and a budget prepared and adopted by this Board after public hearings in the same manner as the Board prepares and adopts its annual County budget and levies taxes as provided by law.

SECTION FIVE: GASPARILLA ISLAND M.S.T.U.

The existing fund will now be known as the Gasparilla Island Fund from which the costs of any municipal service may be paid, either in whole or in part. This fund shall contain all special charges, special assessments, taxes, interest, and other monies collected or otherwise obtained pursuant to this Ordinance or any subsequent resolution thereto.

SECTION SIX: SEVERABILITY

The provisions of this Ordinance are severable and it is the intention to confer the whole or any part of the powers herein provided for. If any of the provisions of this Ordinance shall be held unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, the decision of such court shall not affect or impair any remaining provisions of this Ordinance. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent that this Ordinance would have been adopted had such unconstitutional provision not been included herein.

SECTION SEVEN: EFFECTIVE DATE

This Ordinance shall take effect immediately upon receipt of official acknowledgment from the Secretary of State, State of Florida, that it has been duly filed with that office.

On behalf of the Board of Directors of the Gasparilla Island Conservation and Improvement Association (GICIA), I am writing in support of the proposed expansion of the existing "streetlighting" MSTU to include invasive exotic animal species control.

As you know, the iguana population on Gasparilla Island has been increasing since the early 1990's and the current population is estimated exceed 10,000. Residents complain about iguanas in their attics shredding insulation, scratching and chewing holes in screens and siding, nesting in crawl spaces, and occasionally dying inside homes. On the other hand, botanists are concerned because iguanas often eat newly forming flower buds and have been documented as a threat to the survival of a very rare cactus found on Gasparilla Island.

As this problem continues to increase, we urge you and your fellow commissioners to expand the existing "streetlighting" MSTU so that the difficult task of eradicating Boca Grande's iguanas can begin. If you have any questions, or if we can assist you in anyway, please contact me.






Boca Grande Community Planning Panel Survey Results Charts per Question Based on May 19, 2004 Data



SECTION 5.

GASPARILLA ISLAND SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL M.S.T.U.

There is hereby created a fund to be known as the Gasparilla Island Solid Waste Disposal Fund from which the costs of any municipal service may be paid, either in whole or in part. This fund shall contain all special charges, special assessments, taxes, interest, and other monies collected or otherwise obtained pursuant to this ordinance or any subsequent resolution thereto.

SECTION 6.

SEVERABILITY

The provisions of this ordinance are severable and it is the intention to confer the whole or any part of the powers herein provided for. If any of the provisions of this ordinance shall be held unconstitutional by any court of competent jurisdiction, the decision of such court shall not affect or impair any remaining provisions of this ordinance. It is hereby declared to be the legislative intent that this ordinance would have been adopted had such unconstitutional provision not been included herein.

SECTION 7.

ALTERNATIVE OR SUPPLEMENTAL AUTHORITY

This ordinance shall not be construed as repealing or superceding any other ordinance or law and is to be construed as alternative or supplemental authority for the exercise of powers provided for herein.

SECTION 8.

EFFECTIVE DATE

This ordinance shall become effective upon action from the Secretary of State that the ordinance has been duly filed.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING LEE COUNTY ORDINANCE NO. 81-63 WHICH CREATED THE GASPARILLA ISLAND SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL MUNICIPAL SERVICE TAXING UNIT, TO INCLUDE THE MAINTENANCE OF A STREETLIGHTING SYSTEM; PROVIDING FOR SEVERABILITY; AND PROVIDING FOR AN EFFECTIVE DATE.

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County, Florida, adopted Ordinance No. 81-63, which created the Gasparilla Island Solid Waste Disposal Municipal Service Taxing Unit; and

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners of Lee County, Florida, finds it necessary to amend Ordinance No. 81-63 to provide for the inclusion of the maintenance of a streetlighting system.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS OF LEE COUNTY, FLORIDA, that:

TITLE: THE ORDINANCE TITLE IS HEREBY AMENDED TO READ:

AN ORDINANCE CREATING THE GASPARILLA ISLAND SOLID WASTE

DISPOSAL AND STREETLIGHTING M.S.T.U.; DEFINING THE

TERRITORY TO BE INCLUDED; ESTABLISHING THE BOARD OF COUNTY

COMMISSIONERS AS THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE M.S.T.U.;

PROVIDING FOR THE TYPE OF SERVICES WHICH MAY BE RENDERED;

PROVIDING FOR THE POWER TO LEVY SERVICE CHARGES, SPECIAL

SECTION 1.







Commissioner James has asked that I also respond to your recent queries to him relative to the black spiny-tailed iguands on Gasparilla Island. Perhaps I can add a little insight relative to the nature of the ecological problems we face. I cannot, of course comment on the politics of the situation or the role that the County might play. They are far outside of my areas of expertise and authority.

I am a zeologist at Florida Gulf Coast University with a strong interest in the problems of invasive exotics. I serve on the National Invasive Species Advisory Committee, a 28-member committee appointed by the U.S. Secretary of the Interior to advise the Cabinet Secretaries on invasive species issues. My role in the Gasparilla Island iguana issue is that I have been working with Lee County Animal Services for the past year in an effort to (1) understand the nature and magnitude of the threats posed by the iguanas, (2) to evaluate whether or not any control or eradication effort might be needed and, if so, (3) how such control or eradication efforts might be most effectively carried out.

I am first, and toremost, an animal lover and did not take on this task to kill iguanss or anything else. Through the course of my work during the past year, I have come to know many of the employees of Lee County Animal Services and I can assure you that they too are interested first and foremost in animal welfare. It is precisely because of my involvement with conservation efforts and the living world that I am concerned about the presence and growing populations of black spiny-tailed iguanss on Gasparilla Island.

This iguana, while a truly beautiful animal, differs substantially from the common green iguana which is frequently kept as a pet. Green iguanas are primarily herbivores. Black spiny-tailed iguanas have a much more diverse dist and feed on virtually any animal that it can capture -- as well as on both native and exotic plants. In their native Mexico, for example, black spiny-tailed iguanas prey on the chicks of Brown Felicans. They can readily take the eggs and chicks of Florida snabirds such as Snowy Plovers and Least Terns -- two species whose populations are in serious trouble. They can also take hatchling sea

turtles and gopher tortoises and readily take over the burrows of gopher tortoises on Gasparilla. Last summer I found a Red-bellied Woodpecker nest with hatchlings one week and the next week found the woodpecker nest occupied by a black spiny-tailed iguana that had likely consumed the nest occupants.

You mentioned a "study" done by W.H. Kern, Jr. of the University of Florida and cited many different predators on iguanas and the idea that most young iguanas are killed by these predators. This was not a study done on Gasparilla Island, nor was it merely referring to black spiny-tailed iguanas. Mr. Kern's article ("Dealing with iguanas in the south Florida landscape"), which was very well written, is a useful summary of information about iguanas in general. But it includes information relative to several species and several areas, and was merely a compilation of information gleaned from various literature references. There have been no detailed studies of the natural predators of black spinytailed iguanas on Gasparilla. We know (1) that some of these predators do not exist on Gasparilla, (2) that predator populations there are smaller than in mainland areas, and that (3) the burrows of black spiny-tailed iquanas (unlike those of some iquana species) are not easily excavated by potential predators. These iguanas seek out rocky areas and concrete slabs and foundations under which they excavate branching burrows that extend many feet, such that digging one out to obtain eggs is very difficult. Predators are exercising little control over the black-spiny-tailed iquana population on the island and it is growing. Indeed, it has already spread from the island. We have records of these iguanas now from both north and south of Gasparilla. Some of the iguanas, for example, were taken from Gasparilla to Keewaydin Island in Collier County and the population there is growing rapidly. If these iguanas reach some of the more sensitive areas of the mainland, such as the Lake Wales Ridge area, they could wipe out some endangered species.

While these animals did not ask to be brought to Florida, their presence here is a serious threat to Florida ecosystems and they must be controlled or, if possible, eliminated. I agree completely with you that exotic plants are also serious threats. Indeed, one of the problems that the black spiny-tailed iguana poses is that it subsists to a great extent on the berries of Brazilian pepper during winter months. The seeds of Brazilian pepper pass through its digestive tract unharmed and are deposited wherever it goes -- along with a bit of fertilizer. Thus, one invasive exotic is helping to spread another. Other threats posed by this iguana include such things as: (1) It is a major reservoir for a Salmonella pacterium that causes serious illness in humans and other animals. Nearly every iguana we have tested from Gasparilla has tested positive for the bacterium. (2) We have reason to suspect that this iguana is serving as a reservoir for West Nile virus which can be spread from the iguanas by mosquitos to other animals, including humans. We are currently conducting studies to evaluate this possibility. (3) These iguanas climb readily and have already cause power outages on Gasparilla as a result of short-circuiting electrical systems and thus destroying electrical equipment. (4) These iguaras are making extensive purrows into the dunes on Gasparilla and with a storm surge, these burrows could facilitate destruction of the dunes, causing extensive damage to human property and to natural ecosystems.

i agree completely with you that there are many things that the residents of Gasparilia can do to minimize iquana populations and the problems they are causing. One important thing would be to substantially reduce or eliminate Brazilian pepper and other exotic plants on the island. Another would be to put a stop to deliberate feeding of iguanas and the use of landscape plants that are not favored iguana foods. Many iguanas are starving or barely surviving the winter as it is on Gasparilla, and removing midwinter food resources will greatly increase such losses. A home owner can minimize damage to property by iguanas by closing iguana burrows, cleaning up debris that provides hiding places for iguanas, sealing ceramic tile roofs to eliminate hiding places, and screening off attic vent accesses. Any effort to control or eliminate the iguanas on the island must be a concerted and multi-pronged effort.

Because these iguanas are not native, they do not have their natural predators, parasites, and diseases. Thus their populations can grow rapidly. In addition, this species is very prolific. A large female may lay 80 eggs in a season and multiple females may lay in the burrow of a single male. Removal and humane euthanizing of these animals is also an important tool in their control, and in truth may be more humane than starving them to death by removing winter food supplies. Euthanizing of the animals has been done by Lee County Animal Services under the direct control of a veterinarian, and the animals killed have then been turned over to us for detailed study. My students and I, and professional colleagues have learned a great deal from them, but we would all much rather see these animals alive — in their native environment.

I have touched on only a few things in this email, but enough, I hope, that you will understand that we do care about the animals, that the situation is very complex, and that these exotic animals pose some very serious threats to Florida ecosystems. We are searching for alternative and diverse solutions, but I feel that it is very important that we deal with this problem as quickly, efficiently, and humanely as possible.
